Sept. 11 Allen Smutylo: Gold of Another Kind – The Lost Legacy of Georgian Bay, by a Governor General's Literary Award nominee, is a historical, as well as a personal account of the once staggering quality and quantity of fur bearing animals, virgin timber and multitudes of fish that once thrived in Georgian Bay and vicinity. The thrust of European ambition in the New World, plus the pursuit of the Bay's natural resources, rivalled the voracity of any 'gold rush.' Signed copies of Smutylo's book will be available.

October 9 Martyn Obbard: Black Bears of the Saugeen Peninsula A dedicated Research Scientist, Martyn Obbard will discuss the ecology and behaviour of the small, at risk, genetically isolated and unique population of black bears on the Saugeen Bruce Peninsula and how these bears differ from bears elsewhere in Ontario.
